Dear Ms. Allsopp:

On behalf of the public policy group Energy Policy Advocates (EPA), a non-profit public policy institute, and pursuant to the DC Freedom of Information Act, please provide copies of

- I. all *disclosures* made to your Office in 2020 by the law firm Sher Edling, LLP, whether in a Special Attorney Appointment, contingency fee, representation or other 2020 agreement entered by your Office with Sher Edling, LLP regarding climate change litigation; and
- II. all *electronic or hard copy correspondence* sent to or from or copying i) Karl Racine, ii) Kathleen Konopka, and/or iii) Sarah Kogel-Smucker, at any time in 2020, that uses the term Resources Legacy Fund and/or @resourceslegacyfund.org.

These terms are not case sensitive.

Most records responsive to this request should be in electronic format or easily produced in electronic format, and therefore there should be no photocopying costs. If your office intends to seek any cost associated with the searching or processing of these records, however, please also notify me in writing immediately. Please provide an estimate of anticipated costs if there are fees for processing this Request. In the interests of expediting the search and processing of this Request, EPA is willing to pay fees up \$200. Please provide an estimate of anticipated costs in the event that fees for processing this Request will exceed \$200.

We understand that in some instances a public body may charge a fee for the cost of the search, examination, review, copying, separation of confidential from nonconfidential information, and mailing costs. If your Office expects to seek a charge associated with the searching, copying or production of these records, please provide an estimate of anticipated costs.

As noted earlier in this request, EPA is a non-profit public policy organization dedicated to informing the public of developments in the area of energy and environmental issues and relationships between governmental and non-governmental entities as they relate to those issues. EPA's ability to obtain fee waivers is essential to this work. EPA intends to use any responsive information to continue its work highlighting the nexus between interested non-governmental entities and government agency decision-making. The public is both interested in and entitled to know how regulatory, policy and enforcement decisions are reached. EPA ensures the public is made aware of its work and findings via broadly disseminating energy and environmental policy news and developments. The public information obtained by EPA have been relied upon by established media outlets, including the Washington Times and Wall Street Journal editorial page.¹
